NEW OFFSHORE CAREER PATHS FOR DARWIN LOCALS

Verona Heenan and Ashleigh Boschman are embracing an offshore career change with the Ichthys LNG Project.

Two Darwin locals are taking their career experience with the INPEX-operated Ichthys LNG Project to new heights as they venture into new offshore roles.

Ashleigh Boschman and Verona Heenan previously worked for ESS Larrakia at the purpose-built onshore Manigurr-ma accommodation village in Howard Springs, Darwin.

Both accepted opportunities to work for ESS on board the Ichthys LNG Project's offshore floating production, storage and offloading (FPSO) facility, which is located around 220 kilometres off the Kimberley coastline in the Browse Basin.

Named the 'Ichthys Venturer', the FPSO houses around 200 workers and caters meals for up to 350 people daily.

ESS Support Services Worldwide provides services to companies in oil and gas, mining and defence sectors, including catering, cleaning, village operations and facilities management.

Both Ashleigh and Verona completed specialised training before going offshore, including fitness training for the return offshore helicopter transfers.

Ashleigh said she had never experienced anything like her current role before.

"I still can't believe it. I never thought I'd ever need to get on a chopper to get to work!" she said.

"I love sharing stories of me on the helicopter to my nieces and nephews – they think I'm cool Aunty Ash!"

Verona aspires to become a hospitality supervisor and enjoys the opportunity to learn skills in the different areas of hospitality managed by ESS on the Ichthys Venturer.

"The best bit about working out here is our crew," Verona said.

"We have a great support network and I feel like we are really lucky to have each other too."

SURPASSING TARGETS

The Onshore Maintenance Services contractor for the Ichthys LNG Project, Trace JV, continues to strengthen its commitment to employing local Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander peoples and recently surpassed their target.

TRACE JV's Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander peoples employment target is 15 per cent, with a commitment for 16 per cent. Currently TRACE JV's workforce consists of 20 per cent staff who are of Aboriginal and/or Torres Strait Islander descent.

The Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander peoples workforce is employed in a variety of roles across the business including:

- General service technicians
- Instrument / electrical trades
- Mechanical inspector
- Mechanical fitters
- Riggers
- Storepersons
- Coded welder
- Site administrator.

"I enjoy the aspect of being given a task and then being given the autonomy to do it. I am provided with multiple learning opportunities every day and I love the flexibility to balance my work life and home life also," he said.

NEW GENERATION OF STRONG FEMALE LEADERS

Darwin-born mechanical engineer graduate, Rikki Bruce, has had an exciting first six months on the Ichthys LNG Project. Rikki previously secured student vacation work with the Project in December 2017, and after completing her Bachelor of Engineering studies at Charles Darwin University, she commenced her graduate position on the Project in March 2018.

"I chose to study engineering because I knew it would be challenging. I always understood and liked maths in high school and I also thought it would lead to a rewarding career," Rikki said.

"Once I completed my studies I was offered work placements at four different companies, but I chose to work with INPEX on the Ichthys LNG Project."

Joining the Project at a fast-paced and exciting period, Rikki worked as a field engineer during the import of the cool-down liquified natural gas cargo and is grateful for the hands-on experience she has already gained.

"I really like being able to get out on site to learn about a component, rather than just looking at a drawing," she said. "Problem solving has also been an interesting aspect of the job so far, it's great being part of the team tasked with finding a solution."

Outside work, Rikki is an aspiring role model in her community and was nominated by her university thesis supervisor for the 'Young Indigenous Achiever of the Year' Award in 2017. She was selected as a finalist based on her many achievements and extensive community involvement, including an Indigenous Student Ambassador, an active committee member of the Engineering Student Society and Young Engineers Australia, as well as receiving a total of eight scholarships.

Despite her long list of accomplishments, Rikki maintains that her biggest achievement is her son, Elijah, now six years old.

TRANSFORMINGTHE LIGHTHOUSE

Thousands of Darwin festival goers enjoyed a new vibrant saltwater themed mural during the 2018 Darwin Festival.

Local Larrakia artists Shaun Lee (artist name Hafleg) and Jason Lee (artist name Chop) were responsible for an installation which featured a large crocodile, jellyfish, a multi-coloured crab, a brolga, a snake and a turtle. The artwork was completed using spray cans on corrugated iron, over a three day period.

"We were really excited when the Darwin Festival approached us with this opportunity," Shaun said.

"We wanted to stick to our Larrakia roots, so the installation is influenced by saltwater themes with bright and contemporary colours."

INPEX and the Ichthys LNG Project have invested more than AUD \$2.4 million in community organisations and initiatives in the Territory since 2012.



DEVELOPING BROOME-BASED SEAFARERS

SolstadFarstad recently engaged two Broome-based Aboriginal individuals as trainee seafarers on their vessels.

Local organisation, Nirrumbuk Aboriginal Corporation played an integral role in the recruitment process, allowing SolstadFarstad the use of their offices to undertake the information session, interviews and also circulate the advertisement via its networks.

Interest in the trainee seafarer roles was extremely high, with more than 150 applicants. Crewing Manager, Natasha Lindfield, who led the recruitment process, was very impressed with the number of suitable applicants, especially the two successful candidates Rushaun Haji-Noor and William Sibosado-Dia.

Rushaun and William commenced their Integrated Rating Traineeships on 16 July 2018 and will complete a Certificate III in Maritime Operations (Integrated Rating) at South Metropolitan TAFE in Fremantle. They will spend three months studying and residing in Fremantle, before completing nine months' sea time on a variety of SolstadFarstad vessels in Australia. Upon completing the theoretical and physical aspects of the course Rushaun and William will hold qualified integrated ratings, which means these young men will be able to work as offshore marine operators.

Rushaun and William gain leadership skills, share personal experiences and will develop into high-quality seafarers.

Highlights of the Festival included the annual Reconciliation Walk, Opening Ceremony, Movie Night and 'A Taste of Broome' preview.

The Festival culminated in the Kullarri NAIDOC Ball and Awards night.

A graduate of Ashdale Secondary College, Anika Gosling, is undertaking a Bachelor of Arts in psychology (double major) and is striving for a career as a school psychologist.

Achieving this aspiration would make Anika one of only a few Aboriginal school psychologists working in schools in Western Australia (WA). Away from study, Anika is also a successful field athlete in shotput and discus. She held the mantle of WA State Champion in both for many years. She has also represented WA at the National Championships in 2013, 2017 and 2018.

Former Wesley College student Jack Collard is another scholarship recipient studying a Bachelor of Arts, majoring in political science and international relations. He has long-dreamt of learning about the wider world and making long-standing friendships across the globe. With a passion for language, Jack aspires to learn as many languages as possible and is already fluent in Bahasa Indonesian, having studied the language since year five. His dream is to study abroad at the University

of Gadjah Mada in Indonesia for a semester. He is also keen to study in Spain and is studying Spanish at UWA.

Outside full-time study, Jack works as a part-time barista and remains heavily involved with the "Moorditj Mob" at his former school. He provides support and mentoring to students, including explaining the meanings behind cultural dances and passing on the Nyoongar culture through story-telling. He is also a semi-professional basketballer, currently on the roster for State Basketball League (SBL) team, the Burswood Redbacks.

Ashley Maroney is a former student of John Curtin College of the Arts and is also undertaking a Bachelor of Arts majoring in political science and international relations. Ashley is keen to pursue a Law degree following completion of her current studies with the scholarship, she is a step closer to achieving her goal. Ashley won the Rob Riley Award in 2017, which is the highest achieving Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander Australian Tertiary Admission Rank (ATAR) student in WA (97.4) and she is also an accomplished artist with her work exhibited as part of the Perspectives Exhibition.













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
