INPEX LAUNCHES STRETCH RAP 2019-2022

INPEX Australia is proud to be strengthening its solid foundation of engagement with Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander peoples, with the launch of its Reconciliation Action Plan (RAP) 2019-2022.

At community and government stakeholder events held in Perth and Darwin in late August, Vice President Corporate Coordination Tetsu Murayama said INPEX has come a long way since the company began its RAP journey in 2013.

"We are continuing to build on our commitment towards reconciliation, with the launch of our second Stretch RAP.

"As a socially responsible energy company, we are committed to enriching communities across Australia – and are deeply appreciative of the support and friendship of Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander peoples," Tetsu said.

Manager Aboriginal Affairs and Nyoongar Elder Irene Stainton said INPEX is proud to continue working in partnership with Aboriginal and Torres Islander peoples in the spirit of reconciliation, through the actions set out in its RAP 2019-22.

Both RAP launch events were well attended, and government representatives congratulated INPEX Australia's ongoing efforts and achievements.

PRESERVING HERITAGEFOR THE FUTURE

Aboriginal objects of cultural significance are being preserved in an area known as 'Heritage Hill', thanks to the collaborative efforts of the Larrakia people and INPEX Australia.

The objects were located during the construction of Ichthys LNG's onshore processing facilities and – in close consultation with the Larrakia people – it was agreed to move this cultural material to ensure its protection for future generations.

Temporary fencing and signage was installed to identify Heritage Hill as a 'no-go' zone, to comply with heritage legislation in the Northern Territory.

The Larrakia Development Corporation (LDC) was contracted by INPEX to manage the construction and installation of Heritage Hill signage. Its location near Ichthys LNG's gatehouse enables onshore visitors to gain an understanding of Heritage Hill's cultural significance to the Larrakia people. Now that Ichthys LNG onshore construction is complete, the LDC is also coordinating the installation of permanent fencing to protect Heritage Hill.

During a recent visit to Darwin, INPEX Corporation President and CEO Takayuki Ueda acknowledged the importance of preserving cultural heritage. "It's a wonderful thing managing the long-term protection of cultural material at Heritage Hill.

"As our journey continues, over the next 40 years we are committed to working with the Larrakia people to identify additional opportunities for our mutual benefit," Mr Ueda said.

According to Glenn, "We collectively want to leave things better than we found them. Especially for children. This is why we do what we do."

Darwin NAIDOC celebrations

In Darwin, events included the annual Flag Raising Ceremony at the office of Larrakia Nation Aboriginal Corporation (LNAC), a street march and a damper morning tea.

A NAIDOC lunch was hosted by INPEX on 12 July at its Bento café, located at the Ichthys LNG onshore processing facilities. A special bush tucker-themed menu was provided by contractor ESS for the INPEX Operations team with a sumptuous selection of native ingredients including lemon myrtle infused barramundi and kangaroo in a bush tomato chutney.

ESS employees, Pearl and Annette Leedie brought in several pieces of artwork and artefacts made by their late father Mr Simon Leedie (Snr), to share with the Ichthys LNG team. The late Mr Leedie was a Wakka Wakka man whose traditional lands are in south-east Queensland around the community of Cherbourg.
